

Honoring our Elders, Celebrating our History, Welcoming New Members

In the 1920s, a group of liberal thinkers began meeting on Sunday mornings. A presentation by one of them on ethics or current affairs was followed by "vigorous" discussion. In April 1982, they constituted themselves the Fairhope Unitarian Universalist Fellowship. A dedicated building followed in 2003.

This will be a special program to honor the earlier members, celebrate the history of the Fairhope Unitarian Fellowship, and welcome new members. The Back Porch Folk Singers will be performing and will also be honored.

A new PowerPoint presentation for New Member Orientation will explain Unitarianism and detail the Fellowship's history. The program will end with a welcoming ceremony for new members.

Henry Stuart's Diaries & Photos: New Info About the Hermit of Montrose

Catherine King will present new information recently received about Henry Stuart, who hand-built the now 100-year-old Round House at Tolstoy Park in Montrose. Stuart's diaries, photographs, and other documents reveal fascinating information from the man known as "The Hermit of Montrose" and "Ye Olde Weaver."

Catherine King is Chair of the Fairhope Single Tax Corporation Archives ad a long -time docent at the Fairhope Museum of History. A resident of Fairhope since 1966, she continues to be amazed by our fascinating history.

Living with Reverence and Compassion for All Beings



Tracey Glover, JD, is Executive Director of Awakening Respect and Compassion for All Sentient Beings ("ARC"), and Sweet Peeps Microsanctuary, a small sanctuary caring for chickens rescued from the meat industry. She wrote several

Christian Nationalism and Why the Christian Church Must Evolve

For generations, the separation of church and state has not been challenged. The Christian Nationalist movement seeks to blur this distinction... The Progressive Christian church faces a dual challenge. It must simultaneously embrace a prophetic opposition to Christian Nationalism and address declining church attendance.

David Chatel is an Episcopal Priest, mystic, communicator, and rector of St. Paul's Chapel in Magnolia Springs, AL. He is passionate about spiritual fluidity, interfaith dialogue, and human rights. He teaches mindfulness/awareness-based meditation.

Formerly a musician, he can often be found performing in Mobile area venues.

Harry Haft: Auschwitz Survivor who Fought Rocky Marciano

Alan's father, Harry Haft, survived 5 years in 6 different slave labor and extermination camps during WWII, weighting 105lb when liberated. Just one year later, he was in the ring fighting the greatest heavyweight boxer of all time. Alan will tell Harry's story.

Alan Scott Haft wrote his father's biography in 2005. Henry Haft's story was made into an HBO movie in 2022, *The Survivor*, directed by Academy award winner Barry Levinson. Alan is a University of Miami School graduate and now lives in Fairhope.
