I have many, many memories. Before we built the Fellowship, the old grand piano was kept in my living room. We used to have singalongs in my living room with Pinky Bass playing the piano. The Friday picnics on the beach were grand occasions, come rain or shine, with a vast majority, the emphasis on food. George Hinds would use his three fingers to predict how long it was to sundown. Those sun-downs were always spectacular. Joyce Bishop and Clair Gray would announce. "Turn over the picnic basket!" and then we would change seats to get to know all the 20-30 people enjoying the picnic.

Another tidbit is the groundbreaking for the Fellowship with gold shovels and various dignitaries there, including the then Mayor Kant. As President, I conducted the ceremony with gravity until I stepped on a fire ant hill. My gravity was lost.

Still another tidbit was the planting of the trees on the grounds. Celeste Hinds had bought mature trees from Bobby Greene Nursery. Bobby brought a boom truck to lift them into holes. Fellowship members, led by Phil Strniste, guided them into their holes, held them upright, as others shoveled dirt. Almost all lived, and are now huge.

Brian Conway performs with a skill, grace and force that are steeped in tradition but distinctively his own. Well known in the Irish/Celtic community, Conway has won numerous All-Ireland fiddling competitions, and has been called one of the best fiddlers of his generation. His fiddle students, including students in the Baltimore-Washington region, have won multiple local, regional, and all-Ireland championships. He is a leading exponent of the tastefully ornamented Sligo fiddling style made famous by the late Michael Coleman. The winner of two All- Ireland junior titles and the All-Ireland senior championship of 1986, Brian's early studies were with his father Jim of Plumbridge County Tyrone and with Limerick born fiddler/teacher Martin Mulvihill. However, it was the legendary fiddler and composer Martin Wynne who taught him the real secrets of the County Sligo style. Brian is currently promoting his latest CD titled "Wallace Avenue".

Don Penzien has long been a top-flight performer of Irish traditional music. He frequently is on the road playing concerts and festivals with Gailfean (Brian Conway, John Whelan, Máirtín de Cógáin), The Máirtín de Cógáin Project, and Haley Richardson, and he has served as accompanist for numerous other well-known performers (e.g., Gerry O'Connor, Randal Bays, Tim Britton, Jimmy Crowley, John Williams, Pat Broaders, Gabe Donohue, Ben Jaber, Tony DeMarco, Billy McComiskey, Sean Clohessy, Bridget Fitzgerald, Kevin Doyle). Widely recognized for his reserved backing style, Don's dexterous work on DADGAD-tuned guitar provides solid, driving rhythms to traditional tunes as well as perceptive and sensitive accompaniments to songs and airs. Don is a Michigan native with strong roots in Irish culture and an affinity for Irish traditional music. He now resides in NC where he works as Professor at the Wake Forest School of Medicine.
