The Nominating Committee puts forth the following nominees for the 2026 Board of Trustees to be elected at the annual meeting of the Fellowship Sunday, December 7, 2025:



For Chair of the Board - Nick Coulson

Nick Coulson is a retired architect from UK who has lived in Fairhope for 30 years. He loves the Fellowship and the values it stands for. He has been happily organizing programs for the Fellowship for 2 ½ years. After these years on the Board as 2nd Vice President/Program, he now feels ready to take on the task as Chair of the Board, trying to bring the wonderful cast of characters as Board members to some semblance of agreement and move the Fellowship forward.

For President: Mary Anderson

I moved from Moorhead, Minnesota to Daphne, Alabama in late January 2024 and found the Fellowship soon thereafter. The previous 20 years, I had been actively involved in the Unitarian Church of Underwood in Minnesota, serving on the Board and numerous other volunteer positions. Coming here, I had vowed not to get myself so involved again but that didn't last long. I am currently the Chair of Member Supports and have led several other projects.

I was raised on the farm, went to a small country Lutheran church, attended Augsburg Lutheran College in Minneapolis, married, had children, then grandchildren and great-grandchildren. I worked as a public servant for over 30 years, and I served on the boards of several non-profit organizations.

Now in my 80's, I am a stay-at-home girl. What I like doing most is planning and organizing projects, and meeting and greeting folks at the Fellowship.

I look forward to serving on the Board of Trustees and under the duties of President, acting as your Sunday Service leader.

For 1st Vice President – Mary Matthews

I am from Eastern Kansas and lived there until moving to Baldwin County.

The duties of the First Vice President are to fill in for the President if he/she can't be at the meeting.

I have been a member of FUF for 15 years. I've been on the Board for three years in two different positions, 1st Vice President and Corresponding Secretary.

I am one of the three people who run the monthly potluck, and I regularly stock paper and other supplies as in-kind contributions. I also produce the Weekender and the Sunday program by gathering information, formatting the

documents, sending them to the printer and picking them up, sending them to the Administrative Assistant for emailing. I also pass out the programs each Sunday and have visitors sign in for mailings.



For 2nd Vice President/Program – Mark Preston

I was born in NYC, 1961, and grew up in Bergen County, New Jersey. I graduated Ridgefield Memorial High School, 1979. I attended NYU and graduated Baruch College, BA in Computer Science, 1983.

I worked in television casting company from 1981 to 1985. I started a career in real estate in NYC in 1985 and then co-owned and operated Preston Properties/JM Preston Properties 1988-2020

I volunteered part time in NY as a child abuse investigator/New York State Peace Officer 1995-2005. I was a member of the Actors Fund of America Inner Circle (Charitable organization for the theatre community) from 1990 to 2010. I was also a member of the Amateur Comedy Club, a private theater company established in 1883, where I co-chaired special projects and produced numerous shows, from 2003 to about 2015. I joined the Episcopal Actors Guild in 2007 and am a lifetime member. I served on the executive board for several years and produced several events for them prior to leaving New York for Alabama in 2020.

In the years between 2013 and 2019 I also had several bands - Mark Preston and the Traveling Men, Mark Preston and the Acoustic Travelers, and The Mark Nelson Preston Quintet. We played numerous shows throughout the New York area over the course of seven years. We did release several singles, and there is an album I recorded right before Covid hit which was complete, just not released, that I do plan on releasing soon!

Since coming to Alabama, I did some real estate for a few years but after an eye disease diagnosis I had to stop working and now I dedicate a good deal of my time to the Fellowship!



For Treasurer – Sandra Tormoen

Sandy Tormoen is the president of the board of The Baldwin County Trailblazers and an avid cyclist, walker, hiker, and sunset admirer. She serves as the finance hair for the Eastern Shore Democrats and is the chair of the Finance Committee for the Fairhope Unitarian Fellowship. I have been active member of the League of Women Voters for nearly three decades. I coproduce several international, lesbian literary Zooms and in-person conferences. Historical archivist, I codesigned the website for the Southern Lesbian Feminist Activist Herstory Project: www.SLFAHerstoryProject.com. A professional journalist, PR writer, author, and editor, I maintain, edit, and write for this and other websites.

My aim is to engage in overthrowing patriarchal values (power over), and reinstalling matriarchal (power shared) values, which means fighting to protect women's rights, civil rights, DEI (diversity, equity, and inclusion), and disability rights. For Corresponding Secretary – Jeanine Herring

FUF HISTORICAL TIDBITS: JEAN LAWRENCE

Some art pieces have been moved around from the sanctuary to the foyer to now feature the work of Jean Lawrence. Jean and her husband, Ed Lawrence, were active members of the Fellowship between 1997-2019. Ed served two years as President of the Fellowship and was a driving force here and within the community.

A respected artist, Jean had attended the Art Institute of Chicago and was a major advocate for the arts. It was Jean who spearheaded arts initiatives at the Fellowship Hall from its beginning.



Now displayed in the foyer are three pieces in tribute to Jean and Ed Lawrence. The paintings represent one category of Jean's artwork. When young Jean acknowledged that she was fascinated by "swamps," thus began her paintings of wetlands. She saw strangeness and beauty but also became aware of the importance of wetlands to the environment. She saw ambiguity in that they are neither water nor firm land; she saw the beauty in their starkness, bleakness and changing light.

In an article dated April 19, 2009, the AL.com had a feature to promote the Fairhope Unitarian Fellowship's exhibition of art with commentary by FUF members and artists, Jean Lawrence and Pinky Bass. In this article Jean said:

Art, along with music, lectures and film, is synonymous with the intellectual vigor of the [FUF] diverse membership ... [The art] fits in perfectly in that Unitarians don't believe only one thing. We have all sorts of ways of representing. ... Everyone looks at the art exhibit; they talk about it. We have very active discussion groups—people are intellectually alive. We think of it as a kind of oasis, a place where we can be who we are, and we don't have to hold our tongues. Nobody is proselytizing. We have Buddhists, Jews and Christians, atheists, agnostics and who knows what else? And we all just get along. It's amazing.

Jean's legacy at Fairhope Unitarian Fellowship continues. Today, Mark Oehler is the Chair of the Arts Committee who continues to arrange art exhibitions. Pinky Bass recently oversaw the popup art sale which was a huge fundraising success. Art remains a feature of the Fairhope Unitarian Fellowship's celebration of life and common search for — meaning.


<u>December 28</u> Hopes and Resolutions for the New Year
